Spring Brush Collection

April 15-19, May 13-17*, June 17-21*

Brush is not to be placed in the roadway. Please place brush at the edge of the lawn as per STORM WATER MANAGEMENT REGULATIONS. Brush must be ready for pickup the Sunday before the collection begins. Please have the cut ends of the brush facing the street. Do not place leaves or other yard debris on the brush as it will be left. Once we have passed your residence, we will not pickup anything until the next collection date.

LEAVES ARE NOT TO BE PLACED IN THE ROADWAY. Please place leaves at the edge of the lawn per Storm Water Management Regulations.

Residents and/or businesses on the following roads MUST PLACE ALL LEAVES IN BAGS: County Route 513, Cregar Road (from Hilltop Deli to the Cregar Road bridge), Hart Street, Union Avenue, Central Avenue, and all of Center Street. DO NOT PLACE BRUSH OR ANY OTHER YARD DEBRIS IN THE LEAF PILE AS IT WILL BE LEFT.

Recycling Schedule & Info

February 1 and 15; March 1, 15 and 29; April 12 and 26

Newspapers, magazines, junk mail, cardboard, and commingled items are collected.

Commingled items include unbroken glass of all colors, aluminum, tin, and plastics (#s 1 - 7 any size and any shape). These commodities do not have to be separated and can be mixed in open or closed containers of your choice. Please rinse out items and remove lids; labels may remain. *These commingled commodities may be put out in clear plastic bags, but the bags must be clear.*

Items not accepted: aluminum pie plates, ceramic cups, mirror and window glass, light bulbs, drinking glasses, plastic flower pots, Styrofoam, plastic bags, oil jugs, and scrap metal.

Please cross tie newspapers, magazines, junk mail and flattened cardboard into bundles 8 - 12 inches high. The bundles should be placed next to or inside your recycling container for collection. **No pizza boxes.** (See article on page 11.)

Place recycling out the night before your pick-up day. Collection begins early in the morning. If your recycling is put out late and you find the truck has gone by, do not leave the recycling at the curb. Please bring it back into your yard. It will not be picked up until the next scheduled collection day.

Sometimes our collector has a problem and cannot collect all materials from all the streets on the collection day. If they haven't been to your street at all, leave your materials curbside; they should be by the next day. Check the Borough website for updates.

High Bridge has recycling ordinances in place. Check them out on our Borough website.

Trash Collection

Trash is picked up on Tuesdays or Fridays and your area is scheduled for one of the two pick-up days. If you are unsure of your collection day, please call the Borough Hall at 638.6455.

Every bag of garbage must have a Borough of High Bridge Solid Waste sticker on it. Each sticker can be used for 34 gallons or 50 pounds of garbage. If you use garbage cans, place the sticker on the top item in the can so it is plainly visible when the lid is removed by the collector.

For cleanup items ("bulk" items), use one sticker for each 50 pounds of weight. Reminder: Only one large bulk item such as a sofa, chair, etc., per week. White goods (i.e., a stove), as well as televisions, computers, and construction waste will not be accepted.

Place your trash out the night before as collection begins early in the morning. Bring trash receptacles back into your yard by the end of the collection day. Thank you for your cooperation.

The Environmental Committee reminds all our residents to please help us reduce the amount of recycling that goes into our garbage collection. Besides assisting us to meet mandated recycling goals, recycling generates income to the Borough while helping our environment. Thank you!

"Caught Being Green" 2012 Award

Gregory Cooper is the recipient of the High Bridge Environmental Committee's sixth annual Green Award in recognition for being a resident who cares about the quality of our Borough environment and who quietly sets an example for others to follow.

An environmentally-conscientious commuter, Gregory picks up litter as he walks from the NJ Transit parking lot at 5:45 a.m. and again on his return to High Bridge at 4:45 p.m. He was nominated by a fellow commuter who has observed Mr. Cooper picking up litter on a daily basis for years. Many times it is dark and cold with no one around to notice his actions. Mr. Cooper makes his contribution to our town in a quiet way, not looking for any recognition or a thank you; he is taking pride in our town and doing his part to keep High Bridge a nice place to live.

We sincerely appreciate Mr. Cooper's commitment to the betterment of the Borough of High Bridge through his ongoing, environmentally-responsible actions.

This annual award was started in 2007 by the Environmental Commission to recognize High Bridge residents who have been observed on a regular basis going out of their way to be environmentally-responsible citizens.

Past Award Recipients

2007 - Sharon Apperson for providing a trash receptacle along the Columbia Trail and maintaining its upkeep.

2008 - Linda L. Lucas for voluntarily picking up litter along several Borough streets and replacing garbage bags along the fishing area of the Raritan River since 1999.

2009 - John and Denise Hickson for promoting environmentally-responsible business behaviors. They recycle 90% of their garbage; recycle cooking oil; use eco-friendly products such as containers, cups, straws, garbage bags, LED lights; and are working towards using solar panels.

2010 - Wayne Hally for his dedication to picking up litter along several Borough streets and completing a spreadsheet on the litter types and location since 2005.

2011 - Antonio Martinez is someone who loves nature and continues to appreciate it, even after the vitality of the tree or vine has ceased. Antonio is a conscientious trail-keeper who makes rustic designs in his backyard workshop. Benches, chairs, etc. are created with just a hammer, nails, and handsaw; Antonio donated two of his creations to the Solitude Falls overlook.

Paying Property Taxes Online

Do you pay your quarterly property tax bill online? If so, please allow 10-14 days for the payment to reach us.

We have been experiencing delays receiving payments made from online bill-payer services. In order to avoid late charges, kindly authorize payment 10 -14 days prior to the due date.

For your convenience payments may also be dropped off to either Borough Hall or Investors Bank in Clinton.

Homestead Benefit Program

Most eligible homeowners will receive their homestead benefit for 2011 as a credit applied to their May 2013 property tax bills. These homeowners can expect to receive a revised property tax bill or an advice copy that will reflect the amount of the benefit. Homeowners who indicate when filing that they no longer own the property, or those whose principal residence was in a continuing care retirement community, will have their benefit issued in the form of a check.

Arbor Day

Friday, April 26

Arbor Day is an annual celebration that encourages individuals and groups to plant and care for trees. During the first Arbor Day held in Nebraska in 1872, an estimated one million trees were planted. Since then, Arbor Day has spread across the United States and worldwide.

This year's Arbor Day celebration is Friday, April 26. The High Bridge Environmental Commission would like to encourage you to plant trees, shrubs, or other perennials around your home, either on this date or any time throughout the year. Here are a few of the many aesthetic and practical benefits of planting trees:

1. Lower energy bills - Trees can shade your house and reduce your cooling bills in the summer. In winter, trees dissipate the strength of winter winds and can lower your heating costs.
2. Increased property values - Trees are an integral component of landscaping and can boost the value of your home.
3. Reduced noise - Trees effectively reduce urban noise from roads, lawn mowers, and other urban sources.
4. Flood control and erosion mitigation - Tree roots absorb water and reduce runoff during heavy rains, and their roots anchor the soil and prevent erosion.
5. Wildlife habitat - A large number of small mammals and birds make their homes in trees, and many trees are an important source of food. Planting trees attractive to animals is a certain way to see more wildlife in your back yard.
6. Improve your soil - Trees can help to remediate land that has been polluted by either storing harmful pollutants or converting the pollutants into more benign forms. Trees can also be used to filter sewage and farm chemicals such as pesticides.
7. Carbon sequestration and oxygen production - Through photosynthesis, trees remove carbon dioxide from the air and store it as carbon in their trunk, branches, leaves, roots, soil and foliage. In the process, they release oxygen into the atmosphere which all animals need to breathe.

If you are planning to plant trees, please consider selecting native trees. In addition to mitigating problems due to invasive species, native trees provide the maximum food and shelter benefits to wildlife.

What's Up in the Sky for February, March and April?

In this edition of *The Bridge*, we will learn about an exciting object due to appear in our March skies: a newly discovered comet!


From March 10 to 24, Comet PanSTARRS may be bright enough to be seen without the aid of a telescope. Astronomers predict that the best times to spot it will be in the early evening hours of March 12 or 13. Go out immediately after sunset, and look for the comet near the slim crescent moon in the western sky. The moon and comet will set around 9:30 p.m. Comets are unpredictable in their brightness and tail length, so follow the news to see if you should expect to see a bright comet and long tail or just a faint smudge.

So what is a comet? Unlike rocky asteroids and meteoroids, comets are mostly ice with a little bit of dust and rock, so they are often called "dirty snowballs." Comets, asteroids and meteoroids are the leftover bits that didn't form into planets during solar system formation. Comets orbit the Sun (just like the planets do), except they have very elongated orbits. Part of their orbit brings them near the Sun for a short period of time. They spend most of their orbit in the distant outer regions of our solar system.

Comets have three parts: the nucleus, the coma and the tail. The comet's coma and tail only appear as the comet nears the Sun. The nucleus is made of water ice and carbon dioxide ice (commonly known as dry ice), rock, dust, and some other organic materials. As the nucleus gets closer to the Sun, these ices begin to turn to vapor and surround the nucleus to create a small gas "cloud," called the coma. The Sun produces a stream of particles called the solar wind, which blows the vaporized gases in the coma to produce a beautiful long tail. There are actually two tails produced (an ion tail and dust tail). As the comet nears the Sun in its orbit, more ices vaporize to produce a larger coma, and a bigger and longer tail. As the comet moves away from the Sun, the coma decreases and the tail shortens. Comet tails point away from the Sun, and they are much larger than the nucleus or coma, often extending millions of miles through space.

It is worth trying to take a look for Comet PanSTARRS. You won't have a chance to see it again; it will return for another flyby in 110,000 years. However, if you do miss it, you will have a chance to see another comet this year. Comet ISON will arrive in November and December 2013, and it could be even more spectacular than PanSTARRS.

The Pizza Box

Many people assume that pizza boxes are recyclable. In fact, most boxes have recycling symbols on them and are traditionally made from corrugated cardboard. They are, in and of themselves, recyclable.

However, what makes parts of them non-recyclable is the hot, tasty treat that comes inside them, specifically, the grease and cheese from pizza that soil the cardboard.

Food is one of the worst contaminants in the paper recycling process. Grease and oil are not as big a problem for plastic, metal and glass, as those materials are recycled using a heat process. But when paper products, like cardboard, are recycled, they are mixed with water and turned into a slurry. Since we all know water and oil don't mix, the issue is clear.

Grease from pizza boxes causes oil to form at the top of the slurry, and paper fibers cannot separate from oils during the pulping process. Essentially this contaminant causes the entire batch to be ruined. This is the reason that other food-related items are non-recyclable (used paper plates, used napkins, used paper towels, etc).

Many people admit trying to "sneak" their pizza boxes in with cardboard boxes and such. In reality, this does more harm than good as the contaminated cardboard could ruin the whole recycling batch.

Please keep pizza boxes out of the recycling stream.

Commons Recycling Center

The Commons Natural Recycling Center will be open on the following Saturdays in 2013:

Being able to bring your yard brush to the Commons is a service we provide to our residents.

Only brush and tree branches (three inches or less in diameter) may be brought by residents to the area behind the Commons Park on the above noted Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Please do not leave items in plastic bags. Additionally, pieces of lumber/wood, grass clippings and leaves should not be brought to the Commons.

It is against the law to dump any other items and subject to a fine up to \$1000 / 90 days jail / community service. Ordinance No. 2011-21; 2011-23.

We ask if any one observes illegal dumping at the Commons to report the day, time, type of material and the vehicle license plate number to the High Bridge Police: 638-6500.

Commons E-Container

We are pleased to offer residents of High Bridge a place to recycle electronic items, televisions, and computers on a regular basis. There is no need to wait for our recycling event if you need to get these recyclable items out of your home or office. By law televisions and computers cannot be recycled at curbside.

We have contracted with SAMR (the same company that does our one-day event) to have a shipping container placed in the Commons brush area. The container will be available to accept items 9 a.m. - 1 p.m. on the same weekends as the brush drop off Saturdays; the dates are listed on this page to the left and will be noted on the website at highbridge.org.

You will need to show proof of High Bridge residency or High Bridge place of work in order to take advantage of this recycling.

No Freon containing items (refrigerators, air conditioners, dehumidifiers) and no white goods (washing machines, dishwashers, stoves) will be accepted in this container.

We will continue to hold our annual April Electronics Recycling event. (See announcement on page 23 of this year's event.) Along with all electronics, Freon containing items and white goods will be collected at this one-day spring event.

SAMR ensures that all data on any hard drives or other media will be secured and / or destroyed. All materials will be properly recycled in accordance with all local, state, and federal laws.

Items recycled will count towards our yearly tonnage report. Also SAMR will recycle the televisions and computers for free and will pay \$.06 per pound for all other electronics.

News from High Bridge BOE & Schools

Board of Education News

At the December 10, 2012 meeting, the Board of Education recognized Janice Stemple and Bill Stover for their years of service to the children of the High Bridge School District as members of the High Bridge Board of Education. Prior to the November election Mrs. Stemple and Mr. Stover decided they would not to seek re-election to another three-year term.

On Wednesday, January 2, 2013 the High Bridge Board of Education met to conduct the Reorganization Meeting following the November 2012 election. At this meeting the Board completed the process of contracting from a nine-member Board to a seven-member Board. This process has been underway for greater than two years after receiving voter approval. The following members were elected to a seat on the Board and took their oath of office at the meeting:

Kay Daughters-Musnuff	three-year term
Karen Yaskanin-Jones	two-year unexpired term
Alan Schwartz	three-year term
Tom Wescoe	three-year term
Ann Willard	one-year unexpired term

Additionally, the Board elected Mr. Robert Imhoff as President and Mrs. Kay Daughters-Musnuff as Vice-President.

The School District faculty and the Board's Curriculum Committee continue to revise the Mathematics curriculum for grades 6 through 8 utilizing the Common Core Standards. The Board anticipates approving the revised curriculum prior to July which will enable the District to implement the new curriculum in September.

During the winter months, the Board will develop the 2013 - 2014 school budget. The Board will analyze both the revenue and the expenditure sides of the budget during January and February. On Monday, March 25, the Board plans to conduct a public presentation on the proposed 2013-2014 budget. The Board invites all High Bridge residents to attend this budget presentation where public inquiries will be addressed.

The School District will be evaluated under the guidelines of the New Jersey Quality Single Accountability Continuum (QSAC) on February 28 when members of the Hunterdon County Office of Education will visit the District. Since July 2012, the faculty, administration and the Board's Curriculum Committee have been preparing for this evaluation.

One other initiative that is ongoing is the development of the District's three-year Technology Plan. The District is collecting data on currently available technology and is investigating technology needs for both faculty and students. The Board plans to present the components of the Technology Plan at a public meeting in April.

Elementary School News

We are now nearing the half-way point of the school year. We had many events that enhanced the success of our year so far. We completed the first marking period with Parent Visitation Day. Many parents were able to attend and had a great day as they experienced what their children do daily. The PTO sponsored an enjoyable, interactive cultural arts assembly which celebrated many holidays. We ended December with a concert where many of our third through fifth grade students performed. The staff and students are enjoying our monthly Spirit Days, upcoming events such as Kids Night Out, Read Across America and Family Reading Night!

Our staff is continuing to partake in learning opportunities as we participate in professional development. As we learn new strategies, we apply them to our school and reflect upon what is benefiting the students of HBES. We are dedicated to learning as much as possible to continue to be the best teachers we can be.

We are looking forward to continuing to develop as a school as we approach the end of the second marking period and continue to celebrate our students.

Great Backyard Bird Count

The Environmental Committee invites you to participate in the 16th Annual Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC), which will take place from February 15-18, 2013.

The Great Backyard Bird Count is an annual four-day event that engages birdwatchers of all levels in counting birds and reporting their results to create a mid-winter snapshot of the numbers, kinds, and distribution of birds across the continent. Participants count birds for as little or as long as they wish during the four-day period and tally the highest number of birds of each species they see at any one time. At the Great Backyard Bird Count website, they fill out an online checklist to submit their counts.

As the count progresses, anyone with Internet access can explore what is being reported from their own towns or anywhere in the United States and Canada. They can also see how this year's numbers compare with those from the 15 previous years. Participants may also send in photographs of the birds they see. A selection of images is posted in the GBBC online photo gallery.

After the count, scientists analyze the results and post summaries highlighting the year's trends and findings.

The GBBC is managed by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and Audubon with sponsorship from Wild Birds Unlimited.

During the 2012 GBBC, 511 birds representing 31 species were counted in High Bridge.

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ATTENTION RESIDENTS

Borough Ordinance 150-33: **Snow and ice removal.** The owner or tenant of land abutting upon the sidewalk of any street or avenue shall remove all snow and ice from such sidewalk within twelve (12) daylight hours after same shall have formed or fallen thereon. If the sidewalk is covered with snow after it has been cleared, by forces other than nature, it is the responsibility of the owner or tenant to ensure that snow is removed.

Borough Ordinance 184-18: **Designation of snow emergency no-parking areas:**

A. No vehicle shall be parked on either side of any street(s) or parts thereof from November 15th through April 1st, with the exception of Church Street between Fairview Ave and Taylor Street. Those parking in the Church Street area between Fairview Ave and Taylor Street will be required to obtain a parking permit.

B. The above parking prohibitions shall remain in effect after the snow has ceased until the streets have been plowed sufficiently and to the extent that parking will not interfere with the normal flow of traffic.

Borough Ordinance 184-30: **Schedule 9: Parking Prohibited Certain Hours:** In accordance with the provisions of § 184-12, no person shall park a vehicle between the times specified upon any of the following described streets or parts thereof:

Emergency Generator Safety

DANGEROUS CARBON MONOXIDE

- Emergency generator engines produce exhaust gases that contain carbon monoxide, a colorless, odorless and poisonous gas that can be deadly in high concentrations. Therefore, generators must be operated outdoors away from any open windows or areas where harmful vapors may be trapped.
- Operate generators only in clean, dry, well-ventilated areas. Wet or icy conditions create considerable electric shock hazards.
- Do not plug an emergency generator directly into an electrical wall outlet by using a cable with plugs at each end. THIS IS VERY DANGEROUS.
- Be sure that incoming power is completely disconnected before installing or using an integrated system generator.
- Emergency generators are not intended to be continuously operated for long periods of time.
- Generators must be properly grounded.
- Do not overload generators with too many appliances at once. Prioritize your needs. Connect the largest load first; then gradually add new loads, being careful not to exceed your generator's limit.
- Use properly-sized extension cords in good condition.
- Always shut your generator off when refueling. Keep flammable liquids away from hot engines.
- Keep an approved fire extinguisher nearby.

- Help us help you! Please clear any snow away from fire hydrants near your home or business.
- Check to ensure your heating system is properly maintained.
- Chimneys should be cleaned and checked for leaks. A metal can should be used for fireplace ashes and dumped far away from any structure or flammable material. Remember – use a fire extinguisher on small fires only.
- Keep driveways accessible to large fire apparatus even when snow covered. Any delay in accessing your home could waste valuable time.

Emergency Management - Winter Preparedness

We have experienced and survived Hurricane Sandy and the first month of winter. As a community we have come through a very difficult time together. Sandy was a wake-up call. Changing weather patterns and the aged electrical infrastructure will adversely affect everyone as time goes on. An extended loss of power and heat during freezing temperatures should be a major concern for all of us. You can prepare for these types of events in the following ways:

- Consider purchasing a generator, especially if you require electronic medical equipment. Have the necessary connections installed by a licensed electrician. Electrical extension cords pose a fire and trip hazard.
- Keep water, snacks and a sleeping bag and/or warm blankets in your home and vehicle. If you drive Route 78 then you know you can expect to spend time in traffic sooner or later. This can happen on any road in a severe winter storm.
- If you are elderly or have special needs, register with Register Ready. The emergency services rescue teams will know where you are and what they need to do to meet your needs in emergency situations. www.registerready.nj.gov

Communication

We have learned that timely communication to residents during emergencies is difficult or non-existent. During Irene and Sandy, messages were delivered door to door, and we may not always have the resources to facilitate this practice. Text messaging has proven to be one of the most reliable modes during extended power outages.

Get alerted about emergencies and other important community news by signing up for our Notification System. This Notification System enables the Borough to provide you with critical information quickly in a variety of situations, such as severe weather,

unexpected road closures, missing persons, and evacuation of buildings or neighborhoods.

You will receive time-sensitive messages wherever you specify, such as your home, cell, or business phone, email, text messages, hearing impaired receiving devices, and more. You pick where; you pick how.

IMPORTANT

Once you provide your phone numbers and email, you MUST enter contact preferences in order to receive emergency and/or community alerts. <http://www.co.hunterdon.nj.us/communityalerts.html> or https://www.everbridge.net/citizen/EverbridgeGateway.action?body=home&gis_alias_id=1380761

- Prepare for short- and long-term disasters by creating a basic emergency supply kit. The kit should include required medications, a three-day supply of food, water, and other supplies to support you, your family and your pet in an emergency. You can find suggestions at the federal government's Ready.gov website: www.ready.gov/america/getakit/index.html

Keep in mind those individuals that respond to your emergencies are your neighbors and most are unpaid volunteers. Please help them by making contributions to the respective agencies or consider becoming a member of one of the organizations. If you cannot make a commitment to the Rescue Squad or Fire Department, then consider joining the High Bridge Community Emergency Response Team. (See related article on page 5 of this newsletter.) As demonstrated during Sandy, at times of emergencies every pair of hands counts.

Dog License Information

Dog license renewals done after June 30, 2013 will have a late fee assessed of \$10.00 and \$5.00 per month thereafter.

DOG LICENSES ARE MANDATORY for all dogs six (6) months of age or more. At present, we are not mandating licenses for cats. In order to be licensed, a dog must have a current rabies vaccination that does not expire during the term of the license. Since our licensing year runs from January 1 through December, this means that the vaccination cannot expire during the year. To take advantage of the lower fee offered to spayed/neutered dogs, proof of the animal having been spayed or neutered must be presented. If such proof is not available, an Affidavit may be obtained from the Municipal Clerk's Office. If you have previously licensed your dog in High Bridge wherein the spay/neuter proof has already been supplied, it is not necessary to resubmit same with each renewal of your dog's license. However, proof must be presented if requested.

NOTICE: Dogs **MUST** be licensed in the name of an adult at least 18 years of age or more. Failure to license a dog will result in the issuance of a Court Summons which can be issued either against the legal owner of an unlicensed dog or one of the legal heads of household where the dog resides. In other words, even if a dog belongs to your son/daughter or other young adult residing in your household, you remain responsible as being the person "harboring" the animal.

Complete and mail the form below with your check to license your dog. Mail your check payable to "High Bridge Dog Fund" to the Borough Hall, 71 Main Street, High Bridge, NJ 08829. The fees for 2013 are as follows: spayed/neutered dogs \$11.20; unaltered dogs, \$14.20.

Hunting Awareness

The Environmental Commission would like to remind everyone that hunting season began in September. While New Jersey has an extremely low incidence of hunting-related accidents, please keep in mind that High Bridge has open space properties in which hunting is a permitted activity. To check on the exact locations, please phone Borough Hall (908.638.6455).

Deer hunting season runs from September through February. Sunday bow hunting for deer is now legal on Wildlife Management Areas and on private property ONLY. The legislative change does NOT include any firearm hunting for deer nor does it allow any type of hunting with either bow or firearm for any species other than deer.

The Spring 2013 Wild Turkey hunting season will last for approximately six weeks beginning in April.

The 2013 hunting dates, rules and regulations are summarized in the *New Jersey Fish & Wildlife Digest (2012 Hunting Issue)* which is available at local sporting shops including Sportsman's Rendezvous, 174 Highway 31, Flemington (908.788.5828). I Remember When

I remember when. . . Sauerkraut and pigs knuckles were among favorites of mine along with bacon and eggs for breakfast. I would use the toast to dunk into the egg yoke, and I still do the very same thing. My father, on the other hand, would like ham, eggs and potatoes. When my mother served it to him, he would put half a bottle of catsup on it and then cut it up into small, mixed up pieces so badly that you could not recognize what it once was, but he loved it that way!

Back in those days, those of legal age could buy a paper quart container of draft beer from their favorite bar in town. There were seven bars namely Sam Labars Tavern, Schrams Tavern, Mutties Tavern, Reardons Tavern and The American Hotel, Union Hotel, and John Wiegands up on top of Blacks Hill (now Fairview Avenue); these bars would sell beer, too! When I was just a baby, you had to bring a metal beer pail with a handle on it to the bar to buy draft beer to take home, because there were no paper containers at that point in time. Or you brought a glass jar for the beer; "six packs" didn't come along until years later!

By the time I was old enough to drive, gasoline at my father's "Sunoco" station was selling for 19.9 cents per gallon; can you believe that? Motor oil was sold in glass quart bottles with a metal spout for pouring that you had to fill up from an oil drum in the back of my father's store!

Then there was Neapolitan ice cream which was vanilla, chocolate, and strawberry! I loved that, too. When it came to food, I loved everything except lima beans and kidney stew! There was "Redman Chewing Tobacco" and Lucky Strike cigarettes in a dark, green, flat tin with a big red dot within a white circle in the middle of the cover that said "Lucky Strike" and the tin held 20 cigarettes! That's before Americans found out cigarettes can kill you!

Oh yes, I could not leave out Dr. Lyons Tooth Powder! I used that for years. For grown-ups to keep regular, there was always a product called "SERUTAN" which was "NATURES" spelled backwards.

Just had to get all that off my chest! Now I feel much lighter! It's like a big weight off me!

Real Estate Market Update

Are you curious as to how our real estate market is doing in Somerset/Hunterdon counties? Home prices have gone up a bit in the fourth quarter of 2012 as the interest rate continues to decline. Every buyer I have recently done business with asks the same question, "I thought this was a buyer's market; where is the bargain?" The bargain is in the interest rates. There is a huge savings in the interest rate in your monthly mortgage payment and at the end of the loan. Homeowners who are ready to move up in the housing market will sell low, but they will buy a larger house low plus gain on the interest rates. Home prices rose 3 percent in the 12 months through September, according to an S&P / Case-Shiller index, paring the decline to 29 percent from the 2006 peak. The median existing-home price may rise 5 percent in 2013, with comparable gains in 2014, according to the National Association of Realtors. The problem I see now is that there are no properties on the market. Our inventory is so low while buyer interest is high. The reason seems to be the confidence in the real estate market. Experts are predicting the homes sale price to increase again in 2013 which is great news.

While tighter credit standards after a collapse in the subprime mortgage market were appropriate, "it seems likely at this point that the pendulum has swung too far the other way, and that overly tight lending standards may now be preventing creditworthy borrowers from buying homes, thereby slowing the revival in housing and impeding the economic recovery," Bernanke said. (Bloomberg) Unfortunately, this has affected the first-time home buyer. The mortgage industry has still kept a very strict standard for this particular buyer.

Recycling Opportunities

Bottle Cap Recycling: High Bridge no longer has a bottle cap recycling program. However, you may send your plastic bottle caps to The Recap Company, 6465 Lewis Road, Loveland, OH 45140; for more information see www.recapcompany.com.

Car Batteries: Padik Auto Parts, 423 Route 513, Califon, NJ accepts all automotive and light batteries ("wet" batteries). Put the batteries on the rack in the front of the store. The rack is always there so you can drop batteries off anytime 24/7 that is convenient.

Eye Glasses: Eye glasses are collected by the Borough Environmental Committee and will be sent to charitable organizations. Drop off eye glasses at the Borough Library during operating hours (see next item for hours).

Cell Phones, Inkjet Cartridges, Laser Toner Cartridges: The High Bridge Elementary School's Environmental Club is collecting used cell phones, inkjet and laser toner cartridges. The money raised will be used for environmental programs. Drop your used cartridges or cell phones at the Elementary School during school hours or at the High Bridge Library on Main Street during operating hours:

Mondays & Wednesdays: 10 a.m. - noon and 3 - 8 p.m.

Fridays: 10 a.m. - noon and 3 - 7 p.m.

Saturdays: 10 a.m. - 2 p.m.

Go in the back door of the Library and place the recyclable items in the marked collection box on the shelf to your left.

Compact Florescent Light Bulbs: The Raritan (Flemington) Home Depot recycles the spiral, energy-saving light bulbs (CFS's, compact florescent light bulbs); they do not take the long, thin tube bulbs.

Hard Plastics: The Environmental Committee continues to search for a vendor willing to provide a hard plastics recycling event for our Borough; check the Borough website for updates.

Styrofoam: UPS accepts Styrofoam peanuts and noodles. UPS is located at 1802 Route 31 North in Grayrock Plaza. The hours are Monday to Friday 8:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. and Saturday 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Sunday the store is closed. For info: 638-3500; website: store4525@theupsstore.com. Please note: UPS no longer accepts large, solid pieces of Styrofoam.

Wood: At this time, wood cannot be recycled. You must cut it into no more than 4-foot lengths and tie it in a bundle for garbage pickup. One 50 pound bundle counts as a bulk item.

If you have large amounts of wood from a remodeling project, then you must take it to the Hunterdon County Transfer Station (see info this page). Again the pieces must be no more than 4 ft. in length. No creosote railroad ties allowed.

Notes:

1. Household batteries can no longer be recycled at the Department of Public Works Facility. Household batteries are no longer being recycled by the County due to new federal regulations. Household batteries can now be safely disposed of in your regular trash; do not bring any more batteries to the Department of Public Works.
2. Plastic Bottle Caps are no longer recycled (effective 9/2011). See the top item in this column.

5. **Junk mail & office paper:** Unshredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box) or it may be placed in a *clear* bag.

Shredded junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

6. **Newspaper:** Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. *Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.*
7. **Paperback books:** Paperback books will be accepted.
8. **Plastic bottles # 1-7:** Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. **All containers MUST** be emptied and rinsed.
9. **Telephone books:** Telephone books will be accepted.
